On this day we pay respect to the Indigenous children who never returned home from residential schools, as well as to Survivors, Intergenerational Survivors, and Indigenous communities. The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day take place on the same day. Orange Shirt Day, an Indigenous-led grassroots initiative, serves as a powerful reminder of the lasting intergenerational impacts of residential schools on individuals, families, and communities. It promotes the important message that "Every Child Matters." The orange shirt symbolizes the cultural loss, the stripping away of freedom, and the diminished self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations. By wearing orange, we honour their stories, amplify their voices, and commit to ongoing efforts towards healing and reconciliation.

We acknowledge the deep harm caused by residential schools and the ongoing impacts of colonialism on Indigenous communities.
